

# **COMMUNITY HUB**PROGRESS UPDATE

Campbell Park Community Council



We're pleased to bring you the latest news on the progress of our much-anticipated Community Hub.
Things are really starting to take shape, and we're keen to share all the exciting developments.

We're not just building a hub – we're building a sustainable one.

The installation of new solar panels is progressing smoothly. Panels have been mounted on the roof and will be connected to a battery system.

The solar panels will significantly reduce the hub's energy reliance on traditional power sources. They could provide a substantial portion, or even all, of the hub's electricity needs, contributing to sustainability and lowering long-term operating costs.

# What will be happening at the Hub?

It has been some time now since we featured details of what will be in the completed building and for some newer residents, this may be the first time you have read about our project. The new Community Hub will offer:

**Community Hub Café** is a welcoming and inclusive space to enjoy affordable drinks, snacks and meals. The Café operator will also be offering initiatives, in partnership with CPCC, that will serve the needs of the local community and the wider community of MK.

**Community Larder** is a dedicated space that will offer food available to anyone who needs it, at a very low cost. The idea is to reduce food waste by redistributing surplus or donated food from supermarkets, restaurants, local farms, or individuals, with the emphasis on sharing resources in a sustainable and supportive way.

**Multi Use Space** is available to the community free of charge for a range of activities. This could be training sessions, a meeting space for small community organisations or a place for a group to meet.

**CPCC Council Chamber** is where residents are welcome to attend meetings of the council and its committees and get involved in shaping the community.

Our reception area will be on the ground floor and the CPCC offices on the first floor.

Look out for regular updates on our website and all the socials as the building continues to take shape.

# **CHAIR'S REPORT**



I am now into my second year as Chair of Campbell Park Community Council, and can honestly say the progress planned and currently being made is crucial for the growth of the Council.

After many years discussing the location, set-up and design of a

Community Hub for the future benefits of the residents of our 5 estates and industrial commercial areas, we are well into the building and will soon be opening this permanent place where everyone can enjoy and use facilities to relax and arrange meetings with fellow residents in Campbell Park Parish.

It is expected the building in Springfield will be completed in early 2025, and will host both a Community Café and Community Larder. I hope that most residents will enjoy the facilities on offer, and meet friends in a warm and welcoming environment.

Campbell Park Community Council have recently renewed their landscape contract, I am positive from the feedback received from many residents, that the quality and frequency of the work on the estates has greatly improved since we assumed responsibility. I know personally that if a problem occurs we are very well placed with the equipment and manpower to solve any issues very quickly.

During 2024, we have had council elections, losing two councillors, but also welcoming two new residents who have joined to help their neighbours. Following the elections we do from time to time still have vacancies, being a voluntary role we are always looking for residents from the 5 estates we cover to

come forward, anyone living in the area is more than welcome to come along to a Council Meeting and judge for themselves if they feel they can contribute to help the community.

One of my main duties is to Chair the Planning Committee. It is one committee that is never dull or able to relax. Unfortunately, there are still homeowners attempting developments of properties without accessing the proper and appropriate channels and permissions. Sadly it is only when neighbours are affected in their daily lives that these issues surface, and we as a Council can deal with them. We really do need, as councillors, the eyes and ears of the residents to let us know when incidents occur, both in housing situations, parking issues, and illegal fly tipping areas. All our councillors are available by email, with details published in Homeground, or are contactable by telephone. Furthermore, our Council staff are very experienced and care about Campbell Park Community Council being the best it can be.

To demonstrate our determination to look after the interest of all our residents, I can report that over the last 15 months our Planning Committee have diligently reviewed over 120 planning proposals and made submissions to Milton Keynes City Council which has resulted in 8 applications for inappropriate property development being refused.

Our recently relaunched website, social media channels and Homeground magazine, which is published 4 times a year, strives to let all residents know of the events we are hosting. We understand that times have been difficult lately, and the warm space sessions we held within the last year were well received, as are our weekly coffee mornings and seated exercise sessions. I am sure our new Community Hub will offer many opportunities in the future once the doors are open next spring.



With the winter months approaching, please remember we are here to help if needed.

# **CPCC** GRANTS

# Campbell Park Community Council

The Community Council is keen to support groups delivering services in the CPCC area.

Any group, society, playgroup, or charitable organisation in the CPCC area, or benefiting residents of the CPCC area, may apply for a grant from the Community Council. If you can show us that the grant will be put to good use, we are only too pleased to help.

Grant applications will be considered on a quarterly basis (April, July, October and January).

Community Start-up grants are available to new groups within their first 12 months of operation and will also be considered quarterly.

We recently received feedback from YMCA Milton Keynes. Our grant to YMCA contributed towards the organisation being able to continue to provide emergency supported accommodation to young people aged 18-35 in Milton Keynes.



"We have supported young people on their employment journey in a number of ways including:

- Practical employment support sessions (becoming job-ready, CV writing, looking for employment)
- Meet the employer sessions.
- Practical support to get into work (clothing, travel, identification). In 2023/24 Young People were supported into 119 jobs (93 unique individuals). Young people were supported into 71 educational opportunities, 9 young people were supported into volunteering/work experience roles."



We also recently received feedback from Neighbourhood Watch (NW) Association Milton Keynes, following our grant to them in April 2023

"Our most important goal was to reinvigorate NW

that for many residents may have been seen as dead and buried! Key to this was visibility with a fresh, new image and consistent marketing and promotion.

In the 3 target areas, we organised:

- NW and Police partnership leafleting/doorknocking sessions and pop-up shops in Woolstone, Willen and Fishermead.
- Independent contact by MKNHWA to local organisations in all 3 areas to encourage the cascade of information on Neighbourhood Watch to their networks.
- Increase the number of sign-ups over the period to the all-important Police Alerts.
- Increase the number of local NW schemesw.
- A further opportunity was a presentation at the CPCC Annual Parish Meeting, 28th May 2024."

We are pleased to report that **Frank Howe Court** are winners of the Housing21 InBloom gardening competition Best Transformation - Silver Merit award. Residents of Frank Howe Court lead by resident Rose Cox, a keen gardener, put her gardening skills to work and transformed our Main Entrance Area and back Patio Areas with beautiful, coloured flower baskets, and bright potted plants. It has made a notable difference to our Court with residents, friends and family members enticed outdoors to the Patio area to relax, eat, and entertain. They really love it!!



Frank Howe Court Social Club secured a grant from CPCC which funded the patio garden project, "a massive thank you to them for all their support" - Shereen Wilkinson, Local Housing Manager

# **FLOODING**

Extreme weather is becoming more prevalent, and we have experienced flooding twice in 2024 alone in this area, so we have put together this advice to keep yourself, and your home safe.

If continuous rain is forecast, it is worth checking for flood warnings, which are on the governments website: check-for-flooding.service.gov.uk, you can sign up for flood alerts here too. The Met office website gives weather warnings, and you can sign up for weather alerts as well.

If flooding is forecast, and you live in an area that might be affected (or has previously), it might be worth taking a few precautions, like moving valuables off floors, or keeping some flood barrier products (sandbags or some of the commercial products) on hand, just in case. The environment agency has a handy guide for if you're about to be flooded on their website.

MKCC has a sandbag supply, their policy for distribution can be found on the website, CPCC also has some flood defence products, if you think you might need them get in touch with us.

# Five steps for Flood safety

For anyone who may be involved in an incident and believe they may be in danger always telephone 999 to request the appropriate emergency assistance.

### Step 1

Before flood water enters your home, close and lock downstairs windows and doors. Keep the keys safely to hand and move upstairs.

## Step 2

Continue to listen to situation updates from your local radio station and Floodline on: 0345 988 1188.

### Step 3

Stay in your property if safe to do so or until either the emergency services tell you otherwise or the floodwater has gone.

### Step 4

Do not walk through floodwater. If it is necessary to walk through shallow water, take care for hidden holes, obstacles and other hazards.

### Step 5

If you come into contact with floodwater, wash any exposed body parts with bottled or cool boiled water before handling food or looking after wounds.

If you experience internal flooding you should report it to MKCC through their website – they have a duty to investigate all incidents as the Lead Local Flood Authority (LLFA), you can also report blocked drains and gullies here, which helps prevent future flooding. The MKCC website also has useful information on flood and water management.

What to do if a flood alert is issued



### FLOODING IS POSSIBLE SO STAY ALERT AND PREPARE

- Sign up for <u>Flood Alerts</u> if you live near a watercourse e.g. river or brook
- Call the national 24hr Floodline for advice and support on 0345 988 118
- Check and prepare your flood defences like aqua-sacs, door dams or sandbags
- Pack an overnight bag and include any home insurance documents you may need
- Move any vehicles to a safe place
- Alert any elderly or vulnerable neighbours of the flood risk.
- Update or create your own Flood Plan.

# FLOODING IS EXPECTED SO TAKE IMMEDIATE ACTION

- $\bullet\,$  Carry out the actions in your  $\underline{\sf Flood\ Plan}.$
- Move valuables or sentimental items upstairs.
- Take immediate action to protect your property - deploy any flood prevention devices e.g. door dams or aqua-sacs
- Request sandbags from the Council ONLY if there is a severe and imminent risk of flooding to your property
- Sandbags will only be distributed an area where a Council officer has confirmed the risk level.
- If you don't have any flood prevention devices you can fill a bag or pillowcase with soil. Place them in the front of doorways.

- Evacuate your property

# **GRIT BINS IN MK**

MK City Council has 406 yellow and grey (CMK) grit bins in local areas to help residents keep the roads, redways and footways safe to use during cold, icy weather. In autumn, MKCC check these grit bins to make sure they are in good condition and to fill up any that are low on rock salt (grit). To fill up all these bins in one visit would need 190 tons of rock salt. If any of these grit bins are damaged, MKCC will remove them for safety but due to budget pressures, there will be no replacement bin. However, in severe weather additional salt bags may be delivered to any location that is consider high risk for residents to use on the public highway.

## When to use the grit bin

If snow or icy conditions are forecast for MK, you can use the rock salt in the grit bin on public footways and roads. **Salt (grit) is not provided for use on private driveways or private pathways.** Be sparing with any application of salt. If you are hand salting an area, 2 teaspoons is enough to cover 1 square metre of road or footway.

# How to find your nearest grit bin

You can check where your nearest grit bin is on the 'My MK Mapping' tool on the MK City Council's website, www.milton-keynes.gov.uk. A link to this is also on the 'Salt Bins' section on the Winter Services section of the Highways pages www. milton-keynes.gov.uk/highways. On the My MK Mapping tool, enter the street name and on the map, select 'Winter Maintenance'. Any MKCC grit bin will be shown with a G inside a yellow square.


On 14th August,

# FOREST GARDEN TO BE DEVELOPED IN FISHERMEAD WITH FUNDING SECURED TO PLANT 6,000 TREES IN MK



Milton Keynes City Council has pipped other councils in securing Government funding to plant 6,000 trees around the city.

Milton Keynes City Council successfully bid for £325,000 from the Forestry Commission's 'Treescapes Fund' which it will use to plant natives such as oak, hawthorn and birch trees as well as to develop 'forest gardens' in several areas.

Forest gardens are where fruit trees are planted alongside vegetables and herbs in raised beds that communities can care for and benefit from. The city council will involve local people in designing their forest garden and how it will be looked after, with workshops to be announced shortly.

The proposed locations for additional tree planting are Bletchley, Bradville, Coffee Hall, **Fishermead**, Fullers Slade, Grange Farm, Netherfield, New Bradwell, Stacey Bushes and West Bletchley as these areas have less tree canopy cover than elsewhere in Milton Keynes.

"Trees can give so much to communities and to the environment, and in the last year we've planted more than 2,000 trees as part of our commitment to keep Milton Keynes a green, sustainable, and healthy city."

"Winter is our peak tree planting period, and we'll act quickly to plant all the trees supported by this funding in time for spring. We'll also be out and about to involve local residents in designing a forest garden that they can help grow and enjoy for years to come."

# What should you put in your blue lid wheelie bin, blue recycling sack or pink communal bin?:

Please note, recyclable items should be placed into the blue lid bin loose.

Please do not overfill your bin – make sure that the lid closes

If you are not sure, there is a full list of items on MKCC website - https://www.milton-keynes.gov.uk/waste-and-recycling/what-goes-each-binsack

### **Plastic allowed:**

- bottles drinks and milk bottles. Wash, squash and lid back on
- cleaning product bottles, including those with pumps and triggers
- plastic pots, tubs and trays, including black plastic and ready meal containers
- lids loose plastic lids from bottles and jars
- Tetrapak such as juice or milk cartons

### Plastic not allowed:

- bubble wrap
- · wet wipes
- crisp, biscuit, sweet packets or wrappers
- fruit nets
- hard plastics e.g. toys
- · pet food pouches
- soft plastics e.g. plastic bags and cling film
- polystyrene
- · items with food or drink still inside them

### **Metal allowed:**

- · empty aerosol spray cans
- · food and drink cans
- pet food tins
- sweet and biscuit tins
- clean tin foil or foil food trays
- lids loose metal lids from bottles and jars

## Metal not allowed:

- metal pans or tools
- coffee capsules/pods

## Glass allowed:

- · glass bottles
- wine bottles
- · glass jars

### Glass not allowed:

- drinking glasses or Pyrex (this melts at a different temperature to glass bottles and jars so can't be recycled by our plant)
- any other glass item such as perfume bottles, light bulbs or mirror

Please note that broken glass can be placed in the blue lid wheelie bin and pink communal bin, however if you are on a sack collection, broken glass should be wrapped to avoid injury and placed in the black sack.



# RECYCLING

## Edition 2 - What to do with Foil

If the foil or foil tray is clean it should go in your blue wheelie bin.

If it is dirty, you can either clean it before placing in your blue wheelie bin or it is not cleanable, it should be put in your black general waste bin.

# SPOTLIGHT ON FISHERMEAD

Fishermead is named after a field called Fishers Mead. The fishing theme is continued in the street naming. All of the streets are named after Cornish fishing terminology.

The estate celebrated its 50th Birthday in 2023.

The original housing was grouped around squares. A particularly striking area is Kernow Crescent built in 1981 which encloses the local park. The area takes on the grid design like many others in the city, with a central boulevard with the services running off it.

Fishermead has recently welcomed a number of new residents, with the opening of the Pencarrow Mews development, which offers emergency accommodation for families.

At the centre of the estate there is the Co-op and the Trinity Centre (church and community centre). The Trinity Centre has a wide variety of activities taking place and is a popular place for residents to meet. You can also access the Community Larder here every Monday morning. The regular sessions and activities include; community breakfast clubs on Monday and Wednesdays, community cafe and activity sessions on Thursdays and Fridays from 10:30am plus a range of other activities throughout the week.

Fishermead also has a doctor's surgery, dentist surgery and a pharmacy. It also has a wide variety of food shops and takeaways.

The estate has two schools - Jubilee Wood Primary School and The Willows School, as well as Pebbles Children's Centre all of which are located on Fishermead Boulevard.

Fishermead is served by a number of places of worship.

The local park on Kernow Crescent is the responsibility of CPCC. It is ideally positioned in the centre of the estate and offers a wide variety of play equipment for local children. There are a number of other play areas within Fishermead which are the responsibility of MK City Council. There has been some recent works to remove some of the small play areas in poor condition with a programme of improvements expected to commence soon.

At the far end of the Boulevard, adjacent to The Willows School, you will find Fishermead Sports Ground. The Sports Ground is the responsibility of CPCC. The Sports Ground is home to MK Gallacticos FC, who play their league matches here at the weekend. Many of their young players live in Fishermead and surrounding estates. The Sports Ground is also used for informal play and recreation.

There are also bridges which safely take pedestrians across the grid roads to



# LANDSCAPING AUTUMN REPORT

Campbell Park Community Council

### **SEASONAL CHANGES**

As we move out of August into September we have begun the transition onto our Winter schedule. There will be one last mow in November (weather permitting) before our mowers go off for their service.

Some lighter hedge work has taken place across the parish as we move out of the nesting season, but we still have to look out for any late season nests. The late start to summer can shift natures nesting cycle into the Autumn months, especially if warmer weather continues.

The heavier coppicing and shrub reduction will commence in October.

The tractor will be cutting back the bigger hedge lines towards the end of October, it is currently working through the reduction of the "wild areas" with the mower deck, this is necessary to regenerate the growth for next year.

### **BIODIVERSITY AND A GREENER WAY OF WORKING**

The wet Spring and Summer have meant that we are seeing some of the lowest numbers on record for fluttering insects including bees, butterfly and wasps. The wet weather significantly impacts on their chances of mating, records from the big butterfly count have revealed this year showing the lowest numbers since records begun.

We continue to leave large areas of wild grass across all of our estates to provide an abundance of food and shelter for insects that are in decline. You may notice that in some of our areas of large reduction we will leave the dead wood lying in the ground, stack piles of logs or even leave tall pieces of trunk (dead or alive) standing. This is to increase areas of shelter and food for insects, bugs and small animals. Doing what we can to increase biodiversity in our areas.

We have increased our use of battery-operated tools transitioning onto battery powered blowers and hedge cutters and other power tools.

We occasionally have to swap onto petrol hedge cutters if we have a thicker shrub as the battery tools still have some limitations on their power. Although with most of our shrubs getting at least one cut a year this is rarely essential.

### **SHELTERED HOUSING AND FLATS**

MKCC are re-distributing responsibility for landscaping at some of the blocked flats and sheltered housing. Previously under our responsibility, these have now become the responsibility of Housing. We know for definite most areas in Fishermead are now under MKC Housing and sheltered housing including Dexter House, Oldbrook and Springfield Court.


# Hello from everyone at Shepherdswell Academy
